This ACC 200, Introduction to Accounting I class is taught online using <u>Laulima and Zoom</u>. It is not a self-paced course. Students are expected to participate in the Zoom sessions at the class times indicated on the Schedule of Courses. This requires you to have reliable access to a computer with functioning camera, speaker and microphone and connection to the internet. <u>Also, students are required to turn on their video camera (and microphone, when speaking) while</u> <u>attending class.</u> Use of Laulima and McGraw Hill's Connect are required for certain graded assignments.

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Introduction to managerial and financial accounting and methods used to record and report managerial and financial information to decision makers internal and external to the firm.

I have planned this course for you to take the initiative and to make the commitment to prepare for class and to complete the required assignments. *If you need help with this course and/or want to discuss other matters such as selecting a career path, writing your resume/cover letter, etc. please let me know as I'd be happy to help you.* Also, I strongly encourage you to complete and submit all of your assignments prior to their due dates/times because, as noted below, in order to be fair to all students I more than likely will deny any request for make-ups/extensions.

#### PREREQUISITES

Sophomore standing (at least 30 credits). Students who do not meet this prerequisite will be administratively dropped after the drop/add period and will not be eligible for a tuition refund.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES and STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

After completing this course, students should be able to: understand the role of accounting in investing and management; turn accounting data into information useful in the management process; and apply various accounting techniques and concepts in business decision scenarios. Also, students will learn financial statements, their relationships and how they are used for firms' evaluation through ratio analysis. Furthermore, students will learn job order costing, cost-volume-profit analysis, variable costing, performance evaluation using variances from standard costs, performance evaluation for decentralized operations, product pricing, cost allocation and activity-based costing, and cost management for just-in-time environment.
