# **Objective**

The purpose of BUS 313 is to build upon and enhance the knowledge and skills gained in introductory courses to help you better understand the global economics and financial markets that will impact your careers and lives, and to begin to provide experience using these tools to make business decisions. This course covers:

- International trade: comparative advantage, tariffs and quotas, and commercial policy;
- International finance: balance of payments, exchange rates;
- Banking and international economic institutions. Global financial crisis;
- Regional issues in global economy;

## **Prerequisites:**

ECON 130 and ECON 131 or consent.

### **Materials**

Textbook: Gerber, J. International Economics, (7th ed.). Pearson Education Inc. Pearson MyEconLab is required for this course. Power point presentations will be posted on Laulima.

## Requirements

Attendance Policy: Attendance is recommended. Experience indicates that there is a strong and positive correlation between attendance and exam scores.

Homework: Doing homework is probably the most effective way of mastering the course content. It is also important since it reflects the priority areas to which you should give attention. Regular homework assignments will be made on MyEconLab. Unless stated otherwise, please submit the homework on the day it's due.

Quizzes: You will be assigned a quiz after completion of each chapter.

Examinations: There will be two exams: a midterm and a final exam. Each exam will consist of multiple choices and analytical problems. You will take exams online at MYECONLAB and you will have to login to ZOOM and have your webcam open during exams.

Participation: 5 points of your overall grade will come from your participation during classes. Please keep your camera open and ask/answer questions.

If an exam must be missed, the student must request approval from the instructor prior to the absence. No make-up exam will be given without prior approval and will be considered only in legitimate, unavoidable circumstances (serious illness, family emergency, etc). Proper documentation for the absence must be presented. *If allowed, make-up exams will be scheduled at the discretion of the instructor and the instructor reserves the right to deduct points as deemed appropriate. Make-up exams may be more rigorous and graded to a higher standard than the original.*
